I believe that it starts with funding. A city's budget is a moral document. In a capitalist society, value is determined based on how much money you spend and where. I am encouraging you to consider re-allocating the \$10 million planned to go to the Bakersfield Police Department in 2021 to other initiatives, businesses and organizations that will advocate for the health and safety of our citizens, particularly Bakersfield's Black community and other communities of color along with the tens of millions from Measure N.

If this seems like an outlandish concept to you, it shouldn't. There are decades of research, advocacy, data and even the implementation of similar policies in other cities that prove that these methods both decrease police brutality and increase public safety.

Why am I, a 24-year-old with a Neuroscience degree having to email to tell you this? Because you are failing to do your jobs.

First and foremost, this is a public issue, and I am encouraging you to keep the dialogue open to the community. There should absolutely be a citizens review board for law enforcement oversight; I know personally of individuals who have been advocating for this since 2014, *a year before* Bakersfield Police was deemed the deadliest in the country as reported in The Guardian and Vanity Fair, among other publications. I hope that in the six years you have had to consider this matter and the current demonstrations happening in our city and across every single state in the country will encourage you to act (finally) on this important issue.

Furthermore, studies prove that defunding, not incremental police reform provides a long term solution to reducing police brutality. What Bakersfield PD has done since 2015 to change the culture of violence among the force does not go unnoticed, but it is still a far cry from the kinds of significant change that the city's citizens are demanding at this moment. As you may know, the history of policing in America is deeply rooted into its apartheid history. Police enforcement came out of the white supremacist movement to capture those escaping enslavement. Race was and continues to be a defining criteria in law enforcement practices. Combined with the incredibly low bar for police training -- these statistics from the Department of Justice demonstrate that a refrigerator repair technician spends more time in training than a police officer and that of the time police officers spend in training, most of it is spent on firearms skills -- it is no surprise that police brutality continues to this day.

The trending <u>#8CantWait</u> campaign offers suggestions on how to minimize loss of life, but these are the *very least* reforms that can be enacted here in our city to make a difference. I would encourage all of those on the City Council to reflect on this moment and acknowledge that each of you is called both by the citizens of Bakersfield that elected you to office and by the millions of voices across America who have been asking for these changes and have been waiting, in some cases for 400 years for systematic equality to take a priority in the way that we govern.

I am asking you today to make a commitment to:

- Prosecuting police officers who falsify information in the course of an investigation
- Establish and independent review board that investigates and prosecutes all police shootings
- Reallocate the proposed \$10 million and the tens of millions from Measure N set aside for policing and/or incarceration in the 20201 budget to long-term safety strategies such as education, local restorative justice services, and employment programs
- Establish a citizen's review board for law enforcement oversight that includes participation in the budgeting process
- LISTEN to and SUPPORT the black people in this community who deserve the full rights and privileges that you experience in your daily life. Many of them have been working on these issues for decades with little or no funding and without the support of law enforcement.

These demands should not be perceived as revolutionary. They are simply bringing us into the present moment and responding to the reality that is happening all around. These issues and Bakersfield's citizens cannot be ignored anymore. This is a historic moment that is calling you to truly evaluate what it means to be in service to the public and to act in full consciousness to support the lives and dignity of black people.

Thank you for your time, and I look forward to speaking with you more about this issue.

Police Reform and Racial Justice Working Group of Mayors and Police Chiefs Reach Out to Work With Congress

The United States Conference of Mayors' Working Group on Police Reform and Racial Justice met yesterday to discuss policy and administrative recommendations that will be developed and presented to the Executive Committee of the Conference of Mayors to adopt as official policy.

As the mayors and police chiefs came together, in Washington the House and Senate Democratic Leadership along with the Congressional Black Caucus released the Justice in Policing Act of 2020.

At Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot's suggestion, the mayors and police chiefs, along with me and former Chief Charles Ramsey, sent a letter to the House and Senate leadership stating that "We stand ready to meet with you, the bill's sponsors or other Congressional leaders as part of the legislative process.

On the Senate side, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) asked Senator Tim Scott (R-SC) to come forth with a plan for police reform.

A draft of the Justice Act was circulated after White House Chief of Staff Mark Meadows and President Donald Trump's son-in-law Senior Advisor Jared Kushner went to meet with Senator Scott on Capitol Hill yesterday. The draft is made up of ten sections focusing on reporting, accountability, training, and police relations. Some of the sections are still being designed with Senator Scott, Mr. Meadows, Mr. Kushner, and other administration officials.

Our working group of mayors and police chiefs will meet again soon as we develop recommendations fo the Executive Committee.


As we are meeting, it's good to know that both in the Senate and the House of Representatives, both party leaders have stepped up to propose federal law to assist in police reform and racial justice.

Here's a Fact.

The Insurrection Act of 1807 empowers the President of the United States to deploy U.S. military and federalized National Guard troops within the United States in particular circumstances, such as to suppress civil disorder, insurrection, and rebellion. This act provides the "major exception" to the Posse Comitatus Act of 1878, which limits the use of military personnel under federal command for law enforcement purposes within the United States.

Many Presidents have invoked the act. Here are a few:

- Andrew Jackson invoked the act on the Nat Turner slave rebellion in Norfolk, Virginia.
- Grover Cleveland in Chicago on Pullman Strike.
- Eisenhower in 1957 to protect the Little Rock Nine.

The fact that the police force encompasses over 895 million dollars of the county's general fund is shameful and unproductive. Research shows that a living wage, access to holistic health services and treatment, educational opportunity, and stable housing are far more successful at reducing crime than police or prisons (Source: Popular Democracy).

There is not just a need for police reform, but police defunding and abolition, because the entire structure of the police force is inherently corrupt and ineffective. The average police recruit spends 58 hours learning how to shoot and only 8 hours learning how to de-escalate (Source: Campaign Zero). They are not trained or equipped to react to the vast majority of crises. Phillip McHarris (doctoral candidate focusing on race), argues that we must work towards a reality in which healthcare workers and emergency response teams handle substance abuse, domestic violence, homelessness, or mental health cases. I'm sure that we are all aware of the issues facing the black community and that long history of racism and injustice that has culminated in protests and calls for change. While I do support the protests and feel that it's a necessary mechanism for a community to vent their frustrations, I also believe we need immediate policy change.

While I applaud those who have verbally supported the cause, words aren't good enough. Making one policy of banning a chokehold or donating to a BLM fund doesn't help fight the fundamentally broken system or change the officers' discriminatory views.

As a black man who is deeply invested in these issues, I've spent a lot of time thinking about what steps would combat these problems. Here I want to lay out some of my proposals. I understand that you may not be able to take action on some of these, but remember, you have friends in government, you know people who know people, you can propose things and hopefully get them moved up the chain of power or start a conversation.

If you genuinely care about these issues, I urge you to consider what I'm saying and take the time to discuss if any of these are feasible. We need real substantive change, and the only way to do that is to make reforms in a system we all know could be much better.

Proposals:

-Hold officers accountable for crimes committed against people. If there's evidence an officer did something to harm or endanger another person, charges must be brought against them. We can't continue to let officers slide when they hurt people because it emboldens others into thinking that they can get away bad behavior.

-Require all officers to wear body cameras and require that the camera is on at all times. Officers should also wear a separate mic or camera that is always on in case the primary body camera is turned off. I understand many officers turn off their cameras, and this should be a heavily frowned upon practice and investigated. There should be no reason for a camera to be turned off. An officer could argue for their primary camera being obstructed, but for it to be completely shut off, especially during an arrest or stop is unlikely.

-Mandatory police volunteer hours and community service in the cities they work in and required attendance at community events dressed as civilians. As I see it, you can't police a neighborhood you don't engage with. I understand the constraints of overtime pay, but I think you can have a scenario during training or during a regular shift, an officer spends part of their time being with the local community to get to know the people they're working with better. We have to keep in mind that we're dealing with people, and people vary depending on location. The needs of one community may be different from the requirements of another. And you can't know someone's needs until you spend time around them. I think creating this bond would increase trust in the police and confidence in the people.

-Require officers to fill out a card stating who, what, when, where, and why every time they stop someone. In the instance something goes wrong; this allows for a full review into the details of the stop and creates a record for officers who may be stopping people for ridiculous reasons. The information on the card would have to be substantiated by body camera or car camera recordings.

-Train officers in crisis intervention and first aid.

-Create a police misconduct division separate from the actual police to investigate police misconduct and recommend charges to courts when necessary. Having body camera footage, audio from mics, and first-hand statements from the card would aid in these investigations. I understand that internal affairs exists, but I think we have to determine if police policing themselves is objectively an effective way of dealing with issues. Internal Affairs being part of the police gives them an incentive not to be as hard on real problems as they should be. An independent group would have no such bias (Also, it would be a good way of creating jobs and would provide an avenue for people to report on police issues to an organization without fear of retribution.)

-Require all officers to take a Sociology course on Race Relations for a quarter at a local community college during training. I think it's one thing to have a week-long diversity training on a computer where you click through some program, and it's another to be actively involved in a class where you have to learn about the history of race in this country. Having that context and understanding of their position and history will lead to more empathy and a greater ability to correctly police people of color.

-Banning chokeholds (Again I mentioned doing this alone won't solve the problem but we should at least cut out things that can kill people)

-Require warning before shooting.

-Ban shooting at moving vehicles.

-Require de-escelation.

-Require non-lethal force before restoring to shooting.

-Require officers to intervene when they see another officer using excessive force.

-More stringent police screening in the form of psychological evaluations or implicit bias tests.

-De-criminalize drugs or remove extra funding for drug arrests. This will eliminate a large number of unjust arrests. Many police departments are motivated to go into poor communities and arrest people that they know either can't or won't fight a drug charge because they get extra money for making those arrests. I know it's a controversial subject, but I think we need to ask ourselves, is drug possession a matter of morals, criminal behavior, or health? Should

someone's life be ruined for having drugs on them? Does being put in prison contribute to them getting better, or does rehab do that? If it is a matter of criminality and imprisonment is the answer, why aren't police raiding college campuses and high schools all day every day? Why are poor black people targeted for drugs at much higher rates, but rich white kids freely talk about their weed, coke, and psychedelics use? How are there people sitting in jail for marijuana right now, but you go online and see others freely promoting their various weed businesses? We need to take a side with this. If it's wrong, then tell *everyone* it's wrong and act accordingly. If it's acceptable, then tell *everyone* it's acceptable and act accordingly. We can't target communities of color, throw people in jail, break up families, and destroy future employment options because of a record of drug use, etc., but then let white people use the same drugs with no consequence. How fair is it to tell one person, "Kids will be kids" while telling another "You're under arrest?" We need to tackle this critical source of police conflict because, as you read this, another black person is having their life ruined over something white people do daily with no real consequence.

-De-criminalize prostitution. Of all the proposals, this is probably the most controversial. But I don't think it makes sense that a person can legally have sex on camera for money, but the second its off-camera, it's illegal. Again, let's give the police fewer reasons to put people in jail. Let's also allow these people to come forward about people that harm them sexually or physically without being afraid of being arrested themselves.

-Significant increase in funding for public schools in poor black neighborhoods and creating programs that focus on STEM and law. The best way out of poverty is education, and our society benefits from more educated people. More doctors, engineers, entrepreneurs, creators, etc., will always be good for us, and if we care about our progression as a species, we can't let that potential rot. If you want you to help the police problem, invest in the school's ability for these kids to live better lives so that they don't feel like they have to go out and commit crimes to survive. Maybe they come back and help build up their communities, which ends up being better for everyone involved. At the end of the day, if you build up the broken communities that have been ravished by poverty, people will commit fewer crimes, and there will less need for police to potentially get involved with someone. The way it currently works in many communities now is that the schools don't have enough money and break down, young people know the schools are terrible and do illegal stuff to make ends meet (Because most people where they're from doing graduate high school let alone go to college and get a good job), crime goes up because of these people, we respond with more cops which means even less money and attention to schools (More people going to prison too), and the cycle repeats itself.

-Investment in black-owned businesses in underprivileged neighborhoods. Similar logic to the previous point in that if you help uplift a struggling community, you give them less reason to resort to illegal activity to support themselves. Many people are trying to do great things, but they don't have the support necessary to accomplish their ideas. Give us that support, and we can pay you back in kind. But again, you can't just let a community rot and expect things ever to be okay. If you want to help the police problem, black communities need uplifting economically.

-Universal Basic Income (UBI) for those at the poverty line. This is also in the same vein as the last two points. If someone is struggling, how would you expect them to support themselves? As the old saying goes, desperate times call for desperate measures, and many people undertake those desperate measures to get by and end up in confrontations with the police. If you help those people out, they contribute to the local economy, have a better ability to help themselves, and are less likely to do illegal things to get out of a bad situation.

-Raising minimum wage to the living wage in your city as an alternative to the UBI. Again, if you want to decrease the number of crimes in your city, you have to ensure that people can live off work. If I'm working two jobs and still can't afford the basics, there's a problem. Each job should at least pay an amount that'll allow me to afford rent, food, utilities, and internet (You may say this is unnecessary, but it's 2020, and we live in a world where it's essential for a lot of things. If you don't believe me, try living without the internet and phone for three months in today's world and see how well your life functions). Get a committee together and outline how much someone would realistically need to make to afford an apartment and life essentials, talk to landlords, talk to tenants, do your research and find out what would be best for the people.

-Declare hate groups such as the KKK as terrorists.

I want to point out that I don't expect all of these policies to go into effect immediately, but I think that they're all worth the discussion, and I believe that even if one or two could be implemented in some form, then that means we're moving forward.

But what can't happen is a response back saying something along the lines of "Our city is doing great things already! We don't need change, but we believe in the cause!" Because that's not being willing to admit that there's an issue. I know it's uncomfortable. I know it's something that many people still need to do their research on. Putting your head in the sand and not taking real action will lead to more hate, more death, and more distrust. I urge you to consider these ideas, talk to people in your community, talk to people you're connected to, see what can work. Do your research into these issues, and try and see what can be championed.

City Leadership in Addressing Racial Inequities

Over the last week, many mayors and police departments have strongly and publicly condemned the actions by the police involved in George Floyd's death and the violence and aggression shown towards people of color. What else can city leaders do to advance needed racial justice reforms in policing, in light of the momentum generated by the protests? Several proposed frameworks can guide immediate action, including President Obama's Commit to Action, NAACP's criminal justice demands, and 8 to Abolition. A nationwide conversation about efforts to defund the police is now underway: here's what it really means and why city leaders should pay attention.

Public commitments demonstrate leadership priorities, but making immediate policy change will shift the conversation to action. Below are recent actions taken by local elected officials and agencies to reform policing practices. While not an exhaustive list, we aim to provide mayors with guidance on the policy levers that support systems change and ultimately end police brutality and structural racism in criminal justice. We look forward to sharing other examples of leadership within our network soon (stay tuned), and we welcome additional resources and solutions that we can amplify.

The cities, states and countries finally putting an end to police neck restraints

The revenue in the Used Oil Recycling Fund (Fund) has been decreasing due to multiple factors, including the COVID-19 pandemic, car owners going longer intervals between oil changes and increased use of electric vehicles. When the reserve is depleted, and the \$11 million for the OPP cannot be fully funded, a minimum of 50 percent of funds remaining after mandatory expenditures are accounted for must go to the OPP program, as directed by statute. The amount reflected in the Governor's budget for the Oil Payment Program for FY 2020-21 is \$6,000,000. This is a minimum amount based on previous projections, but could increase by \$1.1 million if revenues increase. The projection in the Budget for OPP funding is based on conservative estimates of revenues, liberal expenditure estimates and on the statutory requirement that the minimum funding amount for OPP is half of the funds remaining after mandatory expenditures (PRC 48653(a)(3)(B)(i)).

These include 21 "IMAGE INTENSIFIER NIGHT VISION" sets, and "UNMANNED" vehicle, a "PACKBOT 510 WITH FASTAC REMOTELY CONTROLLED VEHICLE", and a "CAMOUFLAGE NET SYSTEM". The national stock numbers are in the attached list.

Specifically, I'm seeking copies of any invoices, receipts, meeting agenda items, memos and catalogs, among other documents, listing the purchases (and, if possible, the source of funds used for them). I'm also seeking any communications with the city elected officials or their staffs about the purchases.

In addition, I'm seeking digital copies of any internal pictures of the items since you've received them.

In general, I want to stress that I'm only seeking records that don't include any confidential law enforcement or purchasing information. I'm also only seeking summary-level documents about these purchases. I don't expect you to search through every employee's email, for example, but rather to locate readily available records stored by your procurement or purchasing or police command staff that would help me detail the expenditures and the source of funding used to make them.

If you feel some of the records responsive to this request are exempted from disclosure, or if you feel that it's too broad, please let me know. I'm willing and eager to amend the scope of my request to speed the release of the records and reduce any burden on your staff.

I, Heaven Martin, am writing to you today to express my absolute outrage regarding the Bakersfield Police Department 2020-2021 Budget of \$119,972,666. This astronomical police budget is unacceptable and requires serious action. I call upon our elected officials to start divesting from the inherently violent institution that is the Bakersfield Police Department immediately.

I am asking that you, as an elected official, pledge to do the following:

1. To never again vote to increase the Bakersfield Police Department budget.

2. To prioritize the expansion of community-led health and safety initiatives over future financial investment into the Bakersfield Police Department.

In the face of cyclical police violence happening throughout North America right now, there is no better time to commit ourselves to change. What we need in Bakersfield is leadership that can initiate reform that aims towards the eventual abolition of police and prisons - and, in turn, the immense police violence that targets our most marginalized people.

Increased police presence does not keep us safe, rather it directly threatens the lives of our most vulnerable community members (Black, Indigenous, people of colour, transgender, Two-Spirit, queer, unhoused people in the DTES, street-based sex workers, people with disabilities, people experiencing poverty, etc). It is impossible to effectively reform the police to protect the marginalized communities they were designed to target, therefore, we must choose to transition towards abolition.

In order to do this, I call on you and the City Council to reduce funding in these ways:

- * Withhold pensions and don't rehire cops involved in excessive force cases
- * Require cops to be liable for misconduct settlements

* Reduce the size of the police force, and stop sending armed/uniformed cops on mental health-related calls.

Instead of investing in the police, our city must prioritize alternatives like education, increased mental health services, housing initiatives, income security, harm reduction services, accessible rehabilitation, arts and cultural programs, social workers, conflict resolution services, transformative justice, and other vital community-based support systems. These initiatives must support our most vulnerable communities and centre the experiences of Black and Indigenous peoples in Bakersfield.

Mayor Goh, Councilmembers, and City Manager Clegg:

As Board Chair of KernTax, I feel duty-bound to engage with you concerning Measure N. On April 19, 2018, Mr. Tandy addressed a meeting of our board to plead for our support for a sales tax increase due to the dire financial situation the city faced. At our May 17, 2018, our board adopted four essential requirements that were presented to the Mayor, City Council, and Staff. We wanted the Mayor to appoint the Oversight Committee, but this was not allowed by the city's archaic charter. On June 14, 2018, Mr. Tandy agreed to our requirements for support. His commitment to KernTax has been virtually ignored by the city council and staff ever since.

For two years, we have watched the city thumb its nose at the agreement it approved with KernTax. While our city continues to suffer, staff recommended hiring more than 200 new city employees and building two super-regional parks. In contrast, local neighborhood parks continue to be neglected, and other city needs go unmet.

It has made clear — through both physical and digital actions— that Bakersfield must not use its money to fund an organization that has lost its accountability in the eyes of the national public. Time and time again, BPD has shown it is not capable of reform, which is not surprising due to the police force's roots in American slavery. Even when a protester died exercising their right to assemble, **and** the police had the driver who hit him (it is recorded on video), there still hasn't been an arrest. We need Justice for Robert Forbes and his family. But it's more than that. We need to rethink what policing means. Anything less is unacceptable

I ask that you immediately divest from policing and invest in communities. The city of Bakersfield must begin a public, participatory budget process. The BPD must be removed from the Pentagon 1033 program and receive no funding from the Department or Defense that would increase the militarization of police. Finally we need an implementation of Citizen's Review Boards in municipalities to hold police departments accountable and build public confidence.

Washington Action on Police Reform, Mayors Working Group on Police Reform and Racial Justice Reporting Soon

The United States Conference of Mayors' Working Group on Police Reform and Racial Justice led by Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot, Tampa Mayor Jane Castor, and Cincinnati Mayor John Cranley along with Police Chiefs Michael Harrison of Baltimore, Jeri Williams of Phoenix, and W.H. "Skip" Holbrook, Columbia, SC who will report soon on our initial report to the nation on our own policy recommendations on police reform and racial justice.

As we bring forth our own recommendations, the White House, the U.S. House of Representatives, and the U.S. Senate – more divided than ever in modern history – have offered their proposals on what mayors and police departments should be doing to bring police reform to meet the new normal and reimagined role of police officers, some who are employed by a city, some by counties and state governments throughout our nation.

It's important to understand that police reform is now thrust upon the mayors, the cities, to implement reforms that are being called for by everyone.

Public safety at the local level is definitely a basic service that is expected by the majority of Americans living in our cities. As we struggle to meet national demands, we must make sure that, in addition to the national standards set, there are federal funds coming from Washington to help with police reform and to provide billions, maybe trillions, of dollars to meet the social ills and failures of other sectors in our cities.

Reminding all – cities were created to provide basic services for residents – public safety, fire prevention, sanitation, and water. Today, and since the 1960s, the cities have had to assume to deal with national issues and national responsibilities of which they were not created to solve or pay for. As the cry in the streets for "defund the police" is heard, many will accept and own police reform.

At the same time, we must call on the federal government to invest in the social ills of this nation and that has not happened. Former Dallas Police Chief David Brown told us in 2016 in Dallas after his officers were assassinated that today,

many officers are called upon to deal with mental illness, school dropouts, martial discourse, juvenile delinquents, homelessness, and other issues. The national investments have fallen short. We must continue to push a new set of national priorities for the way the federal government spends the money that we send to Washington for Congress is to distribute accordingly to the true needs of our people. Today, it is out of whack. As we reform our local budgets, let's also look at our national budget. Let's not defund the defense department, even though our policy through the years has called for reordering our national priorities. But it may be time to set a new set of national priorities to provide for, in addition to our national defense, to meet what the needs are domestically and in our cities.

In the meantime, here's what Washington is doing this past week. This week, both the House and the Senate are expected to vote on police reform legislation. The House bill, the "George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2020" (H.R. 7120) was introduced in the House June 8 by California Representative Karen Bass, Chair of the Congressional Black Caucus, and reported out of the Judiciary Committee last Friday. It currently has 230 co-sponsors – all Democrats – and is expected to pass.

The Senate bill, the Justice Act, was introduced by South Carolina Senator Tim Scott June 17 and currently has 47 co-sponsors -- all Republicans. On the day it was introduced Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell announced that it will bypass the Judiciary Committee and go straight to the floor this week. Finally, on June 16 President Trump signed an Executive Order on Safe Policing for Safe Communities.

House Chairmen Advance \$1.5 Trillion Infrastructure and Recovery Plan

A group of House Democratic Chairmen just released a \$1.5 trillion infrastructure package to support infrastructure improvements across numerous sectors, including surface transportation (e.g., highways, bridges, and transit), aviation, schools, housing, broadband, drinking and wastewater systems, energy, and public health and other health care infrastructure. The investment is intended to rehabilitate and modernize a broad range of America's infrastructure while creating new jobs and accelerating economic recovery.

The massive legislation – *Moving Forward Act* (HR 2) – developed by seven House committee chairs includes an array of spending commitments to existing programs and new initiatives as well as various tax incentives and regulatory changes to support increased infrastructure investment in local areas throughout the nation.

HR 2 draws extensively upon infrastructure priorities set forth by the nation's mayors, as reflected in recommendations by the Conference of Mayors, including new funding commitments to the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program, the Community Development Block Grant Program, and Airport Improvement Program, among many other programs.

This expanded federal infrastructure commitment, which was further informed by the fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic, builds upon the *Moving Forward Framework* that was released earlier this year by the Chairmen of the Energy and Commerce, Transportation and Infrastructure, and Ways and Means Committees. This *Framework* outlined elements of a \$760 billion infrastructure investment.

The *Moving Forward Act* includes additional provisions developed by seven Committee Chairmen, who yesterday <u>issued this joint statement on their \$1.5</u> <u>trillion plan</u>.

The House Energy and Commerce Committee, led by Chairman Frank Pallone (NJ), has already approved various elements of the package, including legislation authorizing \$17.5 billion over five years for the EECBG Program. Last week the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, led by Peter DeFazio (OR), acted on about one-third of spending package when it approved a \$494 billion, five-year surface transportation (FAST Act) renewal plan.

The House Leadership plans to bring elements of the *Moving Forward Act* to the House floor prior to the July 4th recess.

Here's a Fact.

As Confederate statutes topple, one President of the United States, Woodrow Wilson's name is being removed from New Jersey's Monmouth University campus' Great Hall. Historians continue to validate that he was an avowed racist to the core and never changed even after he was elected the 28th President of the United States. As President, he oversaw the resegregation of multiple agencies of the federal government, which had been surprisingly integrated as a result of reconstruction decades earlier.

Outright dismissal of black employees was common. Upon taking office, Wilson himself fired 15 out of 17 black supervisors and replaced them with white people. The head of the Internal Revenue Service in Georgia fired all his black employees saying, "There are no government positions for negros in the south. A negro's place is in the cornfield."


Wilson was a descendant of Confederate soldiers and identified deeply with the "lost cause" narrative.

Wilson's most famous book as an academic, "A History of the American People" was sympathetic to the Ku Klux Klan. He was a vocal defender of the KKK. In his book, he described them as "men half outlawed, denied the suffrage, without hope of justice in the courts, who meant to take this means to make their will felt."

Wilson's quote favoring the Ku Klux Klan made its way into "The Birth of a Nation", D.W. Griffith's infamous moving promoting the KKK as saviors of the south. "The white men were roused by a mere instinct of self-preservation... until at last there had spring into existence a great Ku Klux Klan, a veritable empire of the south, to protect the Southern country."

President Wilson is the only President interred in Washington, DC. His remains are entombed into our National Cathedral – which is the place where our national leaders assemble for solemn and celebratory national occasions.

Dear Mayor and City Council,

My name is Valerie Urso. I am a resident of Bakersfield in the 93309 zip code, Ward 5. I am writing to demand the reallocation of funding from BPD to social and public programming that takes place in our communities. It is crucial that the Council postpones its budget finalization process until we can discuss the future of our city as a community. We have yet to be able to do so.

I know you are in the late stages of budget finalization. But, 2020 has not been a normal year. Community members have been preoccupied with the basics of trying to work from home, safely delivering food to their families' elder members and unforeseen childcare burdens. We have not had time to organize ourselves along your Council's schedule. Again, this is not a normal year.

You may have noticed: there is a huge amount of community interest in the budget right now. An incredible, unprecedented level of interest. You've been getting the emails. You know the Black Lives Matter movement has been engaging more and more people. You know that other cities are watching us.

The recent murders of unarmed Black men, including the murder of Robert Forbes here in Bakersfield, demand we change the way we approach policing and the justice system.

The BPD should not be the first line of response to the homeless or mentally ill. I've personally called them for a family member with mental illness and had the specially-trained BPD mental health response team out to my house and to our doctors' office, more than once. My experiences were beyond appalling.

On one occasion, despite the fact that the family member's psychiatrist had himself called the police in fear for our safety, BPD sent my family member home with me. The family member later assaulted me, broke my possessions and burned my things in the backyard.

BPD also told my family member that he could legally take the vehicle we share, immediately after I told them that this family member had told me that he was going to suicide by driving into oncoming traffic. I will never understand why BPD chose that moment to tell my family member that I had "no legal ability to keep the car from him".

After BPD left, the psychiatrist suggested that when we get home, I simply hide the keys and pretend that I don't know where they are.

This advice, in all likelihood, saved lives.

My family member was finally 5150'd and later 5250'd. This means he had to spend a month at a behavioral health facility before he wasn't a danger to anyone else or to himself. It took four calls before BPD finally took him in. Two were from his mental health providers, whom BPD ignored. Again, sending someone dangerous home with me over and over again.

So: I want a dedicated, autonomous community response team that understands mental health. I want more behavioral health support. I want people whose entire motivation is deescalation and the rehabilitation of people in mental health crises. I do not want this team to work underneath the BPD. The BPD would work for them, like the BPD is supposed to work for us, the community.

I want more beds at the homeless shelters and more transitional services to bring them from the shelter to a permanent home. Throwing the homeless in jail accomplishes nothing. Throwing the mentally ill in Mary K. Shell accomplishes nothing if they're back on the street within days.

We have a fundamental breakdown between emergency services and the services actually needed to help people get back on their feet financially, emotionally and mentally in this city. You are tasked with fixing it, and yet you are funding the BPD at 41% of the city funds.

This year, my voice and many other voices have not had a chance to be heard, because the pandemic has shut down our ability to speak. We need more time to hear from our community and strategize for the rest of the year.

I said that 2020 has not been a normal year. But neither will 2021.

Here's what you're looking at over the next twelve months: without direct intervention from our city, we will be facing a steep increase in our already out-of-control homeless population here in Kern County.

The jobs lost during the pandemic are not all coming back. People are behind on their rent. People are already paying 40% of their paycheck to rent in this county. They don't have savings.

When the suspension on evictions is lifted, where will they go? What state will these people be in, subjected to living on the street during a public health crisis? How will we handle it?

Right now, Bakersfield's budget reflects that the main thing we are going to invest in is police, with 41% of the budget going to "community policing" style responses, which are not what we want as a community.

We need services for human beings to meet their basic housing, food, education and health needs, including mental health needs.

We don't need police with guns to show up and apply the only solution they have, which is punitive: violence or jail.

We especially will not need this in a post-pandemic society, facing the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression.

Postpone the budget finalization. Don't let arbitrary schedules and dates and the comfort of doing the same thing you've always done keep you from making smart, forward-thinking choices.

Listen to the community; let's think outside the box and come up with a plan that will work for our city, together.

The following is my comment regarding the fiscal year 2020-2021 Budget (Item 12a). Please forward this email to the City Councilmembers and include it in the record for the Wednesday, June 24, 2020 City Council meeting.

My name is Adeyinka Glover and I am a resident of Bakersfield. While the Fiscal Year Budget is typically finalized in June of each year, the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Budget allocations made by the City Council and staff are not responsive to the current societal climate. The budget released on June 10th looks very similar to the City Manager's budget preview he released in early May. Given COVID 19 and the consistently rampant racial injustice that people face across the world and specifically in Bakersfield, this budget should look substantively different.

Unfortunately, I have never had the privilege to feel protected or served by the Bakersfield Police Department. Sadly I know I am not alone in that sentiment. To know that the City allocates 41% of its general fund to law enforcement is a lot of discretionary dollars that can be put to much better use to serve the community of Bakersfield. I would like the City Council to instead use some of those dollars to create an affordable housing fund to support households that face financial burdens with rental assistance and mortgage assistance. The City Council should step up to keep people housed. Furthermore the fund should also include security deposit and down payment assistance funding to help people establish stable housing.

Bakersfield speaks proudly about how some cities are seeing a decline in population growth yet Bakersfield has more people moving to town--in part because it is affordable compared to some of the larger cities like Los Angeles and San Francisco. I don't think the City Council has done enough to address the affordable housing needs of residents in the city. There needs to be more attention paid to people who are being priced out of their own housing and neighborhoods in Bakersfield. People I've had the privilege to speak with over the years want a variety of affordable housing options, apartments, single family homes, and duplexes.

Good afternoon, my name is Jazmin Rodriguez and I am currently a Criminal Justice major at Bakersfield College.

I wanted to address the 10 percent budget increase going to the Bakersfield Police Department and ask that you reconsider the proposal. The current funding being given to the BPD should first be handled in a way that addresses both the needs of the community and police officers. Our officers handle difficult and strenuous duties throughout their career, starting in the academy. With ever increasing stress stimuli, officers do not have the necessary resources that address their mental stability in a healthy and unique manner for each one of them. By practicing the redistribution of current funding within the department, officers will be able to receive proper psychological therapy once these programs are available.

Instead of placing funds in weaponry and tactical training suitable for a militarized force, allocate funding towards de-escalation training and communications. As well as administering psychological screening exams to continue testing for future behavioral issues; by doing so, we will be one step closer to understanding the actual safety priorities of our community.

Funding within the department can also be redistributed to address the social issues at hand, some of which we have let the BPD deal with for years. Nowhere have I ever seen a "trigger happy" requirement. Nowhere have I ever observed a demand of corruption. As a resident of Bakersfield's fifth ward I am writing to comment on the upcoming vote to adopt the city budget for fiscal year 2020-2021. I strongly urge the city government officials responsible for producing and adopting the budget to reject the current proposed budget and reassess funding allocations based on the recommendations in the Criminal Justice Reform Coalition's letter included below.

On behalf of the Criminal Justice Reform Coalition, a collaborative of local organizations and advocates working to improve public safety by promoting public engagement, sound policies and transparency and accountability from law enforcement, we write to urge you to reject the current proposed 2020-2021 Bakersfield City budget, specifically the proposed Bakersfield Police Department budget increase of nearly ten percent.1

Increasing money allocated to a police department that by its own recent public admissions is not meeting the needs of the community, is an insult to the hundreds of residents who have put their lives on the line to march for justice in our streets and an even starker insult to the memory of Robert Forbes and impacted community members.2 In BPD Chief Terry's own words, "Policing hasn't done enough. For far too long, the police have decided what the community needs." We can no longer burden police officers with all of the social problems we have failed to meaningfully address. It is time to join the community's call for a fundamental reimagining of public safety in Kern County. It's time to address the root cause of police violence and redirect funds from BPD towards community-based public safety approaches that help communities thrive.

Relying on police to respond to our social problems costs Bakersfield taxpayers millions and does not further public safety. We have criminalized poverty, people of color, and mental illness, exacerbating social problems and reducing public safety for all. This is confirmed in the research conducted by UCLA's Bunche Center for African American Studies- A Million Dollar Hoods (MDH) Report regarding Bakersfield's police response to the unhoused:3

• Unhoused people are disproportionately arrested when compared to their housed

counterparts. In 2017 alone, an unhoused person was arrested an average of 22 times, an astronomical number compared to only 1 arrest for every 25 housed people.
From 2003-2017, when arrests in our state as a whole declined 16.5%, arrests in Bakersfield increased 32%. Bakersfield arrests of the unhoused went from 9% to 32% of all arrests. Especially disheartening was the disproportionate arrest of not only African Americans, but the over-policing of impoverished unhoused caucasion residents in Oildale.

Furthermore, MDH reported that from January 2010-December 2016, the Kern County Jails received 8,604 bookings of people who were later released after having their case dismissed. People spent an average of 36 days in jail on cases that were later dismissed. This cost the community over 29.3 million dollars.4 Compared to the \$5,551 cost to feed, care for and shelter an individual for an entire year.5 The most common charges during this period were: possession of drugs and paraphernalia, failure to appear and driving on a suspended license. These nonviolent offenses are closely associated with poverty and mental health. This is exactly why you need to reject the proposed FY 2020-2021 budget and allow the public to participate in finding alternative community-based public safety approaches.

Police with guns, who've shown propensity to use them too often, should not be sent to do social work, crisis intervention and mental health counseling, which accounts for approximately twenty-one percent of police calls.6 Instead we call on you to consider a model like Crisis Assistance Helping Out On The Streets (CAHOOTS) in Eugene Oregon: CAHOOTS responds to almost twenty percent of police calls with a budget of \$2 million, while the police department spends \$68 million to respond to the other eighty-percent. Our taxes, including funds from Measure N, designated for public safety, should be used to directly address poverty, houselessness, and mental illness, without the added complication of criminalization.

We urge you to reallocate resources from BPD, to programs that will actually address public safety. The Council must immediately move forward to implement a program that provides the appropriate response to police calls, and not simply default to a police response. We recognize the many issues involved in implementing such a program, but we are confident it can be installed by 2021. The Council should immediately consider expanding the work of the Bakersfield Homeless Collaborative, contracting for mental health services, and funding substance abuse programs.

While we applaud partial implementation of certain policies, including the purchase of body cameras, these are only small steps toward a true reform of the current policing model. To demonstrate your commitment to all residents, we also request you immediately adopt data-based public safety goals: ban chokeholds and strangleholds, require deescalation, require all alternatives be utilized prior to the use of deadly force, ban shooting at moving vehicles, have a use of force continuum and require comprehensive reporting. While designed to reduce harm in the short-term, these goals are important steps toward effective, safe and economic policing. We urge you to take action and reject the FY 2020-2021 budget proposal, specifically the BPD's budget increase request, until you've had the opportunity to engage in a community in alternative community-based public safety approaches.

Hi, my name is Carolina Aldaco, and I am a Bakersfield resident and I live in Ward number 6. I am writing to demand you consider the People's Budget Bakersfield for the 2020-2021 fiscal year and revise the current budget accordingly.

Unlike the Mayor and the City Council's budget, which gives almost half of the general funds to the BPD, the People's Budget Bako does not. Survey takers determined that the city should prioritize universal needs (such as housing, childcare, healthy food, clear air and water), pandemic recovery, built environment, and reimagined public safety over the police department. You need to engage directly with communities, especially Black and Indigenous communities — the most at risk of police brutality and murder — to create a budget that serves ALL Bakersfield residents and start to focus on restorative justice.

Over the past two weeks, our city has shown its overwhelming support for defunding the BPD. It has made clear — through both physical and digital actions— that Bakersfield must not use its money to fund the murderous BPD. Throughout this time of mass protest, the police have reacted with violence and unwarranted escalation towards peaceful protestors.

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I ask that you immediately divest from policing and invest in communities. The city of Bakersfield must begin a participatory budget process. The BPD must be removed from the Pentagon 1033 program and receive no funding from the Department or Defense that would increase the militarization of police. Finally we need an implementation of Citizen's Review Boards in municipalities to hold police departments accountable and build public confidence.
