

Brundage Lane Navigation Center: By the Numbers


One-year in operation



- Over 750 Individuals Served
- Over 100 Individuals Placed Into Permanent Housing
- 14 Individuals Reunited With Family

70 Individuals Turned Away Each Week on Average

Brundage Lane Navigation Center - Challenges

- Self-exit rate high mental health disorders and substance abuse.
- Finding affordable housing placements difficult.
- Homelessness on the rise across state and nation.
- Until City's investments in affordable housing come online – need near-term solution for growing population.

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Data Sources

- Weekly data reports from shelter operator contractor Mercy House and street outreach contractor Flood Ministries.
- Weekly meetings between City Manager's Office and Mercy House.
- Bi-weekly meetings between City Manager's Office and BLNC Referral Network – Bakersfield Police Department, Code Enforcement, Economic and Community Development Department, Mercy House, Flood and Kern BRHS.

- · Long-Term Care Facilities









Cost Analysis

- Keeping City staff focused on Council goals
- Leveraging State and Federal Funds to offset PSVS-Measure N sales tax investments
 - · Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding
 - U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Emergency Solutions Grants
 - · American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding
 - California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal program
- Rymac General Contracting, Inc.
- Annual operations to rise by \$2,559,263 from the current annual operating cost of \$3,184,247.

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Staff Recommends

- (1) Council approve Amendment No. 1 to Agreement No. 2021-245 increasing the compensation amount of Agreement No. 2021-245 by \$6,014,704.00 to allow for the completion of the construction phase of the BLNC tenant improvement project; and,
- (2) Appropriate and transfer \$5,814,704.00 from Public Safety Vital Services Measure N unappropriated sales tax revenues to the Public Works Department Capital Improvement Project budget within the PSVS-Measure N Capital Outlay Fund.
